#### FREE SCHOOL MEAL PAYMENTS

Any change would be from Monday 8th June at the earliest and as soon as we have further details we will update you.

# Important Information regarding reopening

Below is important information that was sent out this week regarding the POSSIBLE re-opening. I am including it again, in case you missed it.

#### Keyworkers' Children

We have been open to children of keyworkers every day since the lockdown began and this has worked well.

Due to building works on site, we are unable to be open over the half term to those key worker children that have been attending throughout, but, all going well with the building works, <a href="mailto:should-be">should be</a> able to open to keyworkers' children on <a href="mailto:Monday 1st June">Monday 1st June</a>. We ask that children that have been attending confirm their requirements for that week by emailing <a href="mailto:primaryschool@alford.lincs.sch.uk">primaryschool@alford.lincs.sch.uk</a>.

If you are a keyworker, whose child has not been attending school but now needs a place, please email the school to confirm the days needed. We are asking that you attach proof of your keyworker status (payslip, letter from employer etc.)

#### Reception, Year 1 and Year 6

Due to building works taking place, and the extensive preparations that are needed to meet with the government guidance, even if the announcement is made, school will NOT be open to Reception, Year 1 or Year 6 on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> June. We are aiming to have the school ready to accept the following children on the following dates:

Year 1: Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2020 Year 6: Friday 5<sup>th</sup> June 2020 Reception: Monday 8<sup>th</sup> June 2020.

Initially these year groups will be able to attend full time. However, without knowing the Government's plans regarding other year groups, it is possible that this offer may reduce to part time later in the term. When I know, you will know.

The start/end of the day will be staggered to minimise. The exact timings will be communicated at a later date.

### Year 2, 3, 4, and 5

The Government has announced its aim for all primary children to return to school before the Summer break, if it is safe to do so. If classes have to remain at 15 children or fewer, then, unless the guidance changes, school will not be able to house all the children without a part-time rota or using another site.

We await further announcements. Until then, online work will continue to be available on the school website. Due to the extended nature of the closure, we are asking parents to, wherever possible, regularly submit children's work, via email, to the year group emails.

#### After- School Club and Breakfast Club

These will not be starting until further notice following guidance to avoid mixing groups of children, lack of available staff and space capacity.

#### **Attendance**

I am very aware of the anxiety and concerns that parents/carers and the community have over schools being open to larger numbers of children and, at no point will you or your child/children be penalised for not attending. Our survey shows 50% of you have said you will not be sending children back if school re-opens on 1<sup>st</sup> June with only 18% of you have said that you definitely would. Every parent/carer will have to make the decision that is best for their child/family circumstances and we will fully support and understand the decisions that you have made.

As always we are here to support the children/families of our schools and would not want to add to any anxiety or pressure at such a difficult and challenging time for all. Every family has their own thoughts and we respect that, as do all of our staff and their families. We need to remember that we are all different and respect each other for who we are.

What I like most of all, is spending with my family!!








Ellis has been working hard again this week and has really enjoyed the tasks that have been set. Here is a picture of his science work so that you can see the work he has produced - he was so proud of this!

A fact file from Jedd about William Shakespeare.




And from Rubie-Rose: a dolphin – she is learning how to create origami animals!




Here is a fabulous shark model – watch out he doesn't bite!




Writing about Grace Darling by Scarlett N. Well done Scarlett!




A summary of 'The Piano', the Y5 English focus at the moment, by Thomas J. Amazing effort!



One of Casey's maths sheets! He always does so much work!




Great topic work from Lily-Mai
