Lateral Flow Tests for Households with Children?

You may have seen in the news that households with school age children are now able to access Lateral Flow Tests – up to two per week per household member.

Primary children are not being tested but adults living with them and members of a support bubble or childcare bubble can.

Regular testing of people without symptoms is important to help stop the virus spreading and protect your loved ones.

How to get a rapid lateral flow test There are different ways to get a test for members of your child's household, childcare and support bubbles who do not have symptoms of coronavirus.

Members of households, childcare or support bubbles of school staff and pupils

From 1 March 2021, if you're a member of a household, childcare bubble or support bubble of staff or a pupil you can get a twice-weekly test:

- through your employer if they offer testing to employees
- 2. at a local test site
- 3. by collecting a home test kit from a test site
- 4. by ordering a home test kit



Dear Parents & Carers

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Get a test through your employer

Your workplace may offer rapid lateral flow testing to you. Contact your employer to find out more.

Take a test at a rapid lateral flow test site

You can take a rapid lateral flow test at a local site. Testing at these sites is assisted, which means you will swab yourself under the supervision of a trained operator.

You may need to book an appointment.

<u>Find your nearest rapid lateral flow test</u> site.

Collect test kits

You can collect up to 4 home test kits at a local collection point. Each kit contains 7 tests

Anyone 18 or over can collect. You can check online if the location is busy before you go.

Order home test kits online

If you cannot get tested at your workplace, or are unable to go to a test site or collect test kits, you can order a home test kit online.

Do not order online if you can get a test through other methods. This frees up home delivery for those who need it most.

Order rapid lateral flow home test kits

What twice-weekly testing involves

- 1. take a test twice a week (every 3 or 4 days apart)
- report every result to NHS
 Test and Trace on the same day you take the test

Report your test result online or by calling 119.

When I peeked into Year 2, they were quietly writing and reading. Year 3 have been learning French— "Bonjour!" — and colour mixing. Year 4 have been balancing decimals with producing amazing digital art work (more about that below). In Year 5, I was amazed at the beautiful fort diagrams and Year 6 have been inspired into producing fabulous recreations of 'The Starry Night' painting by Van Gogh as well as a bit of cooking too

Attendance has been great – and must stay that way now so that children can really secure any patchy spots in their learning that might have appeared over the last year.

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Time for Road Safety

Term 4 – Primary Parents Schools reopening

Now schools have reopened, the warmer Spring weather will hopefully encourage more parents to make the school run on foot.

It may be a while since parents and children were regularly out and about near to roads so children may need reminding how to stay safe.

There may be more traffic as parents choose to transport pupils themselves instead of using provided options. Some drivers could be out of practice if they have rarely driven since last year.

We have put together some tips for staying safe near the roads.

Top tips for staying safe

- Children should walk on the inside of the footpath, furthest away from traffic and parked cars.
- Children need to stay close to an adult. Younger pupils could either hold your hand or the handle of a pushchair.
- Always teach children to Stop, Look, Listen and Think when crossing roads.
- Encourage children to always wait for the green person before stepping onto a lightcontrolled crossing. Be cautious that some drivers don't always stop for a red traffic light.
- Don't forget to keep a look out for traffic on driveways and in car parks. Please reinforce the message that vehicles can come from any direction, not just left or right down the road.



- Choose safe places to cross roads. Lollipop person (School Crossing Patrols), zebra crossings and light-controlled pedestrian crossings are there to help!
- Remind children, the shortest walking routes are not always the safest!

Road safety education in schools

Road Safety Officers from Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership deliver practical pedestrian awareness to children in year 2 and advanced pedestrian skills in year 6.

If you have a child in these year groups you could ask your child's teacher or head teacher if they have booked or would consider making a booking.
