

Y1 History: How have toys changed since my grandparents were children?

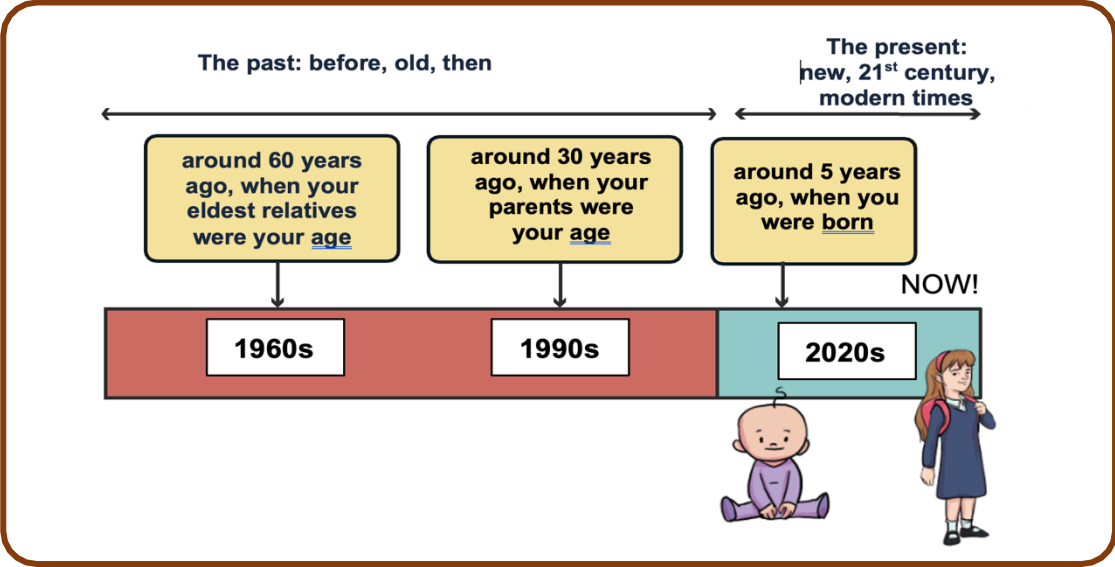
What I know already

- I can use different describing words, for example: hard, soft, furry, smooth, moving.

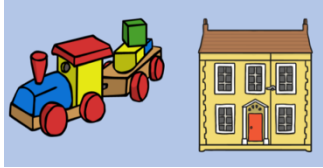
Key Vocabulary

year	an amount of time, from one birthday to the next, or one Christmas to the next
past	an earlier time, before now – last week, last year
then	a time in the past
old	something from a long time ago
present	in this time – this year, this week, or now
recently	not long ago
modern	recent and new
timeline	helps us to put things in the order that they happened, starting with the furthest back in time
decade	an amount of time - ten years
century	an amount of time - one hundred years
material	what objects (like toys) are made from
change	different from how things used to be

Timeline

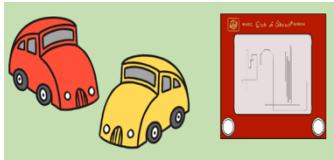
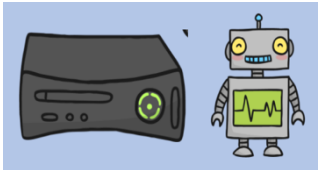


Toys have changed a lot since your oldest relatives were children - what they are made from, how they are powered, and where they are made.



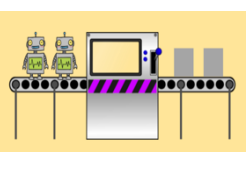
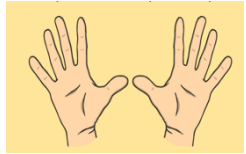
Old toys were often made out of wood, fabric or sometimes metal.

Modern toys are often made out of different types of plastic.



Old toys used wind-up power, or were pushed, pulled or twisted.

Modern toys often plug into the wall (electricity) or use batteries.



Old toys were usually made by hand in this country.

Modern toys are usually made by machines in far away countries.
