
Y6 History: Why is Lincoln an important historical settlement?

The Beginning

Invaders and Settlers

- The first known settlement in Lincoln was by the River Witham at Brayford Water, dating back over 2000 years; it was called 'Lindo', the Celtic (Iron Age) word for 'pool'. - The famous 'Witham Shield', belonging to a local tribe's chief, was found in the river heading east of Brayford. Now in the British Museum, the shield dates from 300BC.

- Lincoln became a major settlement in Roman Britain in 50CE (Lindum Colonia);



Norman Invasion

- William the Conqueror saw the importance of the city, and ordered the building of Lincoln Castle in 1068, on the site of the old Roman fortress.

- In 1092, Lincoln Cathedral was completed, an important symbol of wealth and power; Lincoln grew to be the 4th largest city in the kingdom.

- Lincoln has been a seat of justice since 1068: the castle dungeon has housed and hanged witches and traitors, the prison held debtors and criminals, and Lincoln Crown Court still holds criminal trials today.





The Middle Ages

Industry, Invention and Beyond



- Lincoln was at the centre of a civil war in the 12th century, between Queen Matilda (Henry I's daughter, the rightful heir to the English throne), and her cousin, Stephen; during the Battle of Lincoln (1141), Stephen placed the castle (loyal to Matilda) under

siege, but he was defeated and captured. Matilda was never crowned queen, but she made sure her son became Henry II after Stephen's death. - An original copy of the Magna Carta (1215) is kept in Lincoln; it said that the king and his government had to abide by the law, just like everyone else.



- Many Roman ruins can still be seen in Lincoln; an important Roman road ran through Lincoln, connecting London to York (Ermine Street).

a wooden fortress was built on the top of the hill.



- The Vikings used the Roman walls to defend their settlement in Lincoln: it became an important centre for trade, issuing coins from its own mint.
